Removing barriers to access



- The Cat Protection Society of NSW project **DIVA Cats** Desexing, Identification, and Vaccination Assistance for Cats ran from July 2023 to June 2025, mostly funded by a \$1.5m NSW Government grant
- Research and experience show cost a significant obstacle to desexing
- Existing support included translated fact sheets, multilingual videos, and online directory of vets who speak community languages
- As part of DIVA Cats, Cat Protection commissioned
 The LOTE Agency to consult with key culturally and
 linguistically diverse communities in the target LGAs of
 Canterbury Bankstown and Fairfield




Program approach

NSW GOVERNMENT



- Data mapping
- Engagement with residents, vets and councils
- Discounted or free desexing, microchipping, parasite protection, vaccination, health check and registration (max fee \$20 per client)
- Provision of cat welfare information and resources
- Cat welfare survey
- Desktop comms strategy research
- Focus groups and community interviews
- Workshops with participants who desexed multiple cats under the program





Program achievements

Free or low-cost desexing has been shown to:

- Improve the health and wellbeing of carers & cats
- Improve neighbourhood amenity
- help place more cats into safe homes
- reduced cat population growth



- Exceeded the target of 2,750 cats, with a total of 3,675 cats desexed
- Extension of program to other areas
- Research findings into cat welfare beliefs
- Pilot multicultural communications strategies



Program challenges

- Immense demand (on top of our usual desexing and adoption programs)
- Local councils would not participate or collect data
- Veterinary workforce pressures and vaccine shortages
- Regulatory limits on cat ownership and registration requirement put cat carers at risk; we were unable to secure exemption of registration requirement





Learnings

Communication channels

- Social media
- Community radio
- Shopping centres, chemists, and libraries
- Community notice boards and street posters
- Religious and community centres
- Trusted messengers (vets and vet nurses, local champions, spiritual or faith-based leaders)

Priority messages for cat owners

- Desexing can and should happen before 12 weeks of age
- Desexing is caring and responsible
- risks of waiting and the benefits of early action
- Responsible owners act early to protect their cats

Priority messages for informal cat carers

- Cat welfare services are an ally, ready to help
- Taking small but meaningful actions
- Informal care is a legitimate and valued form of protection



Learnings for improving equity in access

- Data collection and exchange with residents, vets and councils helps to direct resource-limited efforts to areas of greatest need
- Community cat carers are motivated by a sense of duty to prevent suffering and in so doing, they incur significant personal costs of time, money and stress.

- Using **community languages**, make it easy to know where, when and how to access **affordable desexing services**.
- Create clear, welcoming pathways to support, linking carers to tools and advice
