
Common problems

- 1. Lack of basic care or standard practices.
- 2. Cats held indefinitely or in the back.
- 3. Not enough or no enrichment or exercise.
- 4. Too little interaction.
- 5. Lack of pathway planning.
- 6. Cycle of isolation and mental decline.




















Cat feeding and cleaning





- Feed two meals per day.
- Wet food for all cats.
- Remove food after the meal.
- Litter should be as far away from food and water as possible.
- Enough litter to scratch and cover.



Supplies for your daily cat routine

- 1. Interactive toys (wands)
- 2. Scratch surface
- Independent play toys mice, springles
- 4. Churu
- 5. Feral dens (for choice and moving cats)
- 6. Soft texture and hard texture for laying
- 7. Wet cat food







Juvenile and Adult Cat Care Daily Checklist

| Turn lights on. |
|---|
| Feed wet food (or a mix of wet and dry) and remove dirty litter pans and water bowls. |
| Provide fresh litter pans and water bowls. |
| Remove food from kennels (approximately 30 minutes after feeding). |
| Replace any missing or badly soiled kennel enrichment items with fresh ones. |
| Mid-morning rotating enrichment (see schedule on board). |
| Restock food and litter and clean food preparation areas. |
| Kennel breaks and play sessions. |
| Mid-afternoon group quiet time (30 minutes to one hour). |
| Spot clean and afternoon treats/enrichment. |
| Evening spot clean and evening feeding (one hour before lights out). |
| Evening rounds wellness check and lights out. |
